

# Week #3 Game Plan: X's and O's



Are you on the winning or losing team? Often it comes down to simply having the right game plan. This week we continue our *Game On* series and discuss "Sanctification." To sanctify someone or something is to set that person or thing apart for the use intended by the one who designed it. A ball is "sanctified" when used in a game. Cars are "sanctified" when used to transport people. In God's Kingdom, things are sanctified when they are used for the purpose He intends. Someone is sanctified when they live according to God's design and purpose.
